Creative Europe Sub-Programme CULTURE	CULTURE – Cooperation Projects This funding opportunity supports the delivery of cultural and creative transnational cooperation projects across any art form for a maximum duration of four years. The funding is available to creative, cultural and heritage organisations working across any art form, such as visual arts, dance, theatre, literature, performance, music, heritage, architecture, design, circus, festivals, craft and fashion. Creative Europe Sub-Programme CULTURE	CULTURE - Literary translations This funding opportunity supports publishers and publishing houses and enables the translation of literary work from one European language to another, to encourage new audiences and promote cultural exchange. Creative Europe Sub-Programme CULTURE	CULTURE - European Platforms This funding opportunity offers support for European Platforms which promote new and emerging talent though codevelopment, co-production and programming. A platform would consist of members (for example, festivals, venues, libraries, theatres etc.) which together make a commitment to presenting European-produced content and to provide visibility and mobility of new talent (a minimum of 30% of emerging talent). UK funding calls

 BFI Film Fund - The BFI operates the largest public film fund in the UK. Each year they invest over £26m of Lottery funds to support film development, production and distribution activity in the UK and the budget is set to rise to £30m by 2017.

BFI welcomes applications for film projects in all genres. BFI also support independent UK distributors to help ensure that the best British and specialised films connect with a wide range of audiences across a range of platforms. BFI supports sales companies that are launching new UK films at key international film festivals and markets.

BFI provides funding for:

- Feature film production, including international co-production and completion funding
- Feature film development, principally script development
- Talent development (including funding for short films) via the BFI NETWORK
- Feature documentaries
- Production company slate development, via the Vision Awards
- Digital and cross-media activity
- Distribution of feature films in the UK
- International sales of UK feature films and other film export activities

- Creative England Film Production The Creative England Production Fund is targeted at feature films with budgets of up to £2 million from up-and-coming talent or from established directors looking to experiment with innovative approaches. They are particularly interested in projects from regionally-based filmmakers or which have a strong regional voice. They are looking to support around three to five features per annum over the next four years, with production awards of up to £200,000 per project.
